### Flooding

We are doing everything in our power to alleviate the flooding problem on the new site. It is caused by run-off from the housing estate travelling through a drainage pipe under the new site into the field below. It does appear that there is a possible blockage in that field causing water to back up through the pipe. It will be necessary to excavate in that field to determine where the blockage is. This will be done as plant is available.

### Rodent Infestation

It is clear that we have a similar problem to other allotment sites with rodents. It has now been investigated by Herefordshire Council Pest Control have suggested a rolling contractual programme which we will be undertaking forthwith. Please do not lay any treatment on your plots yourselves, they will do the control.

### The new season

I appreciate that the winter has made it difficult do much work on the site. However, I wish to remind you of your obligations of plot cultivation detailed in your tenancy agreement.

Whilst many plots are being treated to a high standard, it is evident that there is a marked increase in poorly maintained plots. This has a detrimental effect (through weed spread and root invasion) on the plots where allotment holders work so hard to achieve good result. It also detracts from the beautiful environs of the whole allotment site. Pride in our allotment site must be restored, and to this end, a more robust monitoring will commence in April. A monthly site inspection will be made by me (or devolved in my absence) and a nominated plot holder. Guidelines for plot monitoring and cultivation will be available from the Town Council Office.

### Weed Control

In an ideal world of allotment gardening, organic principles would be favoured by most of us. The Town Council currently allows the use of proprietary chemical controls. Last year there were complaints by plot holders about some of their neighbours' indiscriminate use of herbicides and pesticides, and, as this seems to be an escalating problem, I intend to review the use of chemicals on the allotment site.

In the meantime, if you must use chemicals, use a proprietary brand, avoid a windy day, avoid your neighbours plot and use to the manufactures' instructions. Please do not dip your watering can into the water butts, if you have used any of these products, as this could possibly contaminate the supply.

### Bonfires

There is no bye law against bonfires; however, I would ask you to use common sense. Do not light a fire if the wind direction is towards the housing estate, or when other plot holders may be at risk of inhaling your bonfire smoke. Only burn organic matter, no plastics etc. and when you leave make sure it is safe to do so, **under no circumstances should a fire accelerant such as petrol be used**, this is extremely dangerous to the user and to any one in close proximity.

The Town Council has appointed a new Deputy Town Clerk, Heather Harding. She took up this post at the end of January and will be looking after the Allotments and is our contact in the Town Council Office. For all Leominster Allotment Association members who do not have access to e-mail please note that the minutes and agenda can be seen on request at the Town Council Office, see Heather. We will leave copies of Newsletters in the Offices and onsite at the allotments.

As an Association that is in place to represent all our members' views and needs, we are a committee very much below the required quorum of 8 and certainly most of us who have been working away for a number of years are feeling the pressure of just keeping going, without the support of members. We have at present a record number of 54 subscribed plot holders, more than half of the total tenants, thanks largely to Heather for explaining the benefits of joining. Now we are asking for something from you in return. We would like to bring back Social Activities/Events which have gone by the board in the last couple of years due to lack of support, so a **BIG** and important **ASK** is that if you are enthusiastic about keeping up our 'growing' community at Ginhall Lane Allotments together with all the benefits of membership and affiliation to the National Allotment Society, please step up and offer your help (much needed and appreciated).

Anyone with ideas as to how they could help stop the possible dissolution of the Association next year, there will be an **AGM on 27th August 2014, 7pm** at the Town Council Offices, during which you can ask questions and put forward ideas and offer your help. If you are unable to attend or would like to talk about your proposed ideas and find a role meantime, speak to a committee member (listed below) or leave a message with Heather by phone/email or pop into the office.

There is a serious possibility of the dissolution of the Association next year if insufficient support is not forthcoming. No further grant applications can be made in future without an Association in place.

## CLOSE AND LOCK THE GATE:

to prevent theft, unauthorised entry, at any time that you are onsite. All legitimate plot holders have a key and can enter and leave as and when they wish. We have had an invasion of sheep on the site recently, not the first time, so if you value the time, energy and most of all your crops please think and take the time to close the gate it will stop four legged invaders as well the two legged variety from entry. (The sheep farmer and landlord have been informed).

The National Allotment Society (was NSALG) have increased their fees by 25p per member. For this year L.A.A. will absorb this increase and include it in the £5 per annum for Insurance and Affiliation. We now have 54 members to represent and anyone wishing to join can contact a committee member or Heather.

The part of the Probation Service that we have benefitted from is to be privatised and therefore it is most likely that the work provided by U.P.W's will not continue in 2015. They have provided labour onsite for a number of years so we will have to manage without this service when they leave.

The Association Committee members are presently working to provide a communal large wooden shed in the centre of the site, securing planning permission, applied for part funding and have agreement from the Landowners/Landlords for this project. It will give all plot holders a meeting place, to exchange views and news, seeds and plants, a friendly cuppa, shelter from the rain and sun (if we get any, sun that is) a place around

which open days/social events can be centred. Allotment Association meetings can take place here on site more appropriately, at least during the warmer weather months.

PLEASE KEEP OUR SITE CLEAN AND TIDY, take all rubbish, non-compostable materials away from the site. DO NOT DEPOSIT ANYTHING ANYWHERE ON THE SITE in the hope that no-one will notice, there are regular inspections to monitor the whole site as well as individual plots. If you have problems keeping up your plot let Heather know the reasons to see what can be done.

Our Landlords have awarded a new contract for mowing the track ways and the areas apart from plots that they are responsible for and we hope this proves an improvement. Please keep planting/ growing within your plot boundaries so that the mowers do not cut down anything you value.

Following the more intensive rainfall of late years and consequent flooding in the lower area of the site and with changing weather patterns the Town Council's property committee have inspected the site and agreed that an improved drainage system is necessary for the lower track ways. This work will be implemented later in the season to avoid disruption to the growing and gathering season. This solution will, we hope, allow previously flooded plots to be let again and give better drainage further up onsite.

The Awards evening this year will not include any awards as we do not have any judges in place and a decision by the Landlords to get the whole site into a more acceptable state will be priority before judging next year, something to aim for! The evening will be an end of season social celebration at the Forbury in Church Street is on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> October when all are invited, details later.

Earlier this year a leaving plot holder donated a good greenhouse which is now in place in the centre of the site and can be used by anyone, no staging in yet and needs a bit of a tidy up, if you use it please respect others, label your produce and leave space for others to use. Please see Ray plot 24 or John Braithwaite plot 61 or 69 to co-ordinate use of greenhouse.

## NATURE NOTES AND OBSERVATIONS:

If anyone has any usual or unusual sightings of wildlife, bees, butterflies, birds, moths, frogs, newts, toads, creepy crawlies that they see we would like to include in next newsletter, or note on the blackboard as a matter of interest. Seen so far this year Elephant Hawk Moth, a large pink and green moth that feeds on rose bay willow herb and grape vine plants, blackbirds nesting in rhubarb patch and spotted by a seven-year-old, (not the first to nest in a rhubarb patch), last year a robin's nest in a shed and despite the heat raised four out of five chicks that fledged.

Spotted woodpeckers nesting somewhere in the trees down near the entrance gates, despite trying to locate the nest they seem to be heard and not seen so far! Sorry no prizes for sightings and if you wish to remain anonymous to protect your special observations just let us know and we will not include any information, but if you feel you want to share this include your plot number in your email or phone call to any one listed above.

Dear Allotment Holder,

### **GINHALL LANE ALLOTMENTS, LEOMINSTER**

Firstly, a big thank you to all the ploholders who have become members of the Leominster Allotment Association this year, and I do hope that you have taken full advantage of the discounts offered at Hinton's store and Phillipots Nursery, as well as of course having the benefit of insurance cover provided on your plot. Your Kings Seeds orders will be taken later in the year by an Allotment Association member. I would encourage you all to support any events that the Association organises, as well as thinking about coming forward as a committee member if you can attend a bi-monthly evening meeting and would like to help in discussing allotment matters, ways of improvement etc. If so, please do come along to the Allotment Association AGM on Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> August at 7pm in the Town Council office, 17 West Street.

I am hoping that by now most of you will have placed a small sign showing your plot number somewhere prominently, or are in the process of arranging this. The Town Council requests that this is completed by everyone by the end of this year please.

You may have noticed that a fresh water standpipe has been fitted on the grass verge at the front of the entrance car park, for the use of everyone, and there is now also a fresh water supply at the basin outside the toilet.

To improve the drainage of the central pathway area of the site it is intended to arrange for drainage pipes to be installed during late autumn, so please be patient if this causes some temporary disruption to access and car parking. Notices will be put up in advance when the date for commencement has been decided. This work should alleviate the standing water that has been causing problems in wet winters/springs, and difficulty with access for ploholders.

A First Aid kit is stored inside the toilet cubicle on the wall, for the general use of all ploholders, if needed.

Dog owners – please do not allow your pets to foul the site, without bagging the mess and taking it home with you to dispose of. Please be alert to thieves, and report any suspicious persons to the Town Council, as some crops have been stolen.

Keeping the gate closed at all times should discourage intruders (both animal and human species) and I thank you all for your co-operation with this.

Once the grass mowing of the site has been completed for the year, the internal access gates will be kept locked in order to protect the grass from being churned up by vehicles during the winter months, particularly by heavy vehicles with full trailers. It is intended to have these internal pathway gates opened for access on certain Saturday mornings between 9-12am strictly dependent on weather and ground conditions, as follows, and at no other times. Please therefore arrange for your manure deliveries etc. to coincide with the following Saturday mornings:

22<sup>nd</sup> November, 13<sup>th</sup> December, 17<sup>th</sup> January, 14<sup>th</sup> February, 7<sup>th</sup> March, 21<sup>st</sup> March, 4<sup>th</sup> April, 25<sup>th</sup> April.

Please would drivers only park in the two recognised car parks (unless briefly delivering to a plot), and not on the grass verges. If anyone knows of a useful supplier of well-rotted manure that could be delivered, for all ploholders to use, please let me know.

There are still a few vacant plots available, so if you know of anyone who may be interested in taking one, please do ask them to contact the Town Council.

If you change your address or contact details, please would you advise the Town Council.

As you can see from the website address above, we now have our very own 'live' website. It means that this newsletter will be available online from now on, as well as being distributed as before. Please let us know of any changes to your contact details so that we can continue to keep in touch with you.

To make sure that you know about what size of shed, greenhouse or poly tunnel are permitted on your plot, refer to your tenancy agreement and the Ginhall Lane Allotments Handbook (also on the Documents page of the website), which will give you all the information you need before erecting a shed or structure to ensure it is appropriate.

Here's a reminder about an appeal to help **SHYPP** (supported housing project for young people). **SHYPP** is a good cause that helps young people cook their own food, devise recipes for seasonal vegetables and share their ideas with others in the same situation. We help by passing on any excess produce to them, so please leave produce in shed no 8, Fanny Howden's plot, by Friday so that it can be collected at the weekend and distributed to **SHYPP**.

The Association has decided to have a stall on the **PLANT FAIR** on **MAY 30<sup>TH</sup>** which takes place on the GRANGE during LEOMINSTER FESTIVAL week. This is to raise funds and awareness of our lovely Allotments and all the benefits of GROWING YOUR OWN. See the poster on site and on the website for more information about this event and give us your much-needed support. There are also plans to have a stall at the Leominster Car Boot Sale – details later.

The **COMMUNITY SHED** is now furnished and waiting for visitors, so please come and see what it looks like. Read the magazines, have a break in it and if your own shed is full of kit, come and sit in our BIG shed. Your key to the gates will unlock the shed as agreed, but please put the lock inside so that it is not lost (it would be very expensive to replace) and lock up when you have finished your visit. The books and magazines have been donated are for all to use so please be responsible and replace them so that others can refer and use this resource. Please don't take them away from the site.

The **KITCHEN SHED** will soon be ready to use, this will have to be kept locked when not in use as there will be a small gas stove for tea/coffee making as well as a mains cold water supply for washing up. Grass has been planted around this area and ideas for the remaining surrounding parts are in progress.

If there is anyone with SEWING SKILLS and ideas could you please make up some bunting to decorate our communal buildings (nothing political - only pretty and/or garden related).

At the time of writing we are advised by Town Council that the **DRAINAGE** scheme is on hold. However, as a possible interim measure, suggestions to dig out a pond and some drainage channels to capture excess water,

has been made and will be discussed when further details are known. This information will go onto the Website.

Our membership fees for the Association remain at £5.00 per person/plot, despite another increase by NAS of 25p (National Allotment Society). The £5 fee covers you for insurance, affiliation to the NAS and the other benefits of discounted seeds from Kings, and discount from Hintons and Philpotts Nursery. For those members who pay their rent by Direct Debit we will be looking into the practicalities of offering the same method of Direct Debit for the Association fees for next year. Please pay as usual to any member of the committee or at the Town Council office.

As all orders are individually wrapped for your convenience, please add the £1 package charge for this service to your order. John manages our seed orders with meticulous attention to detail and we thank him for his continued commitment.

### **Update on Community Site**

### **Update on the allotment site Flood Alleviation**

Drainage work on the track way between the car parks is due to commence on 5<sup>th</sup> October. The track way will be inaccessible for approximately three weeks, so please park in the 1<sup>st</sup> car park and walk along the grass paths. The ground is becoming quite soft so driving is not advisable. Indeed, remember that the five-bar gates will be put in position once it is estimated that the grass track ways would be damaged and rutted by vehicular use.

A new composting facility is planned for part of the currently unused area of the site. There will be three composting bays, the proposed dimensions of which are to be 6' H x 8' D x 10' W, and will be for the use of allotment gardeners (good for those with pernicious weeds) as well as the employees of the Town Council who will also turn the compost. So good news – watch this space!

While the majority of gardener's value and respect this beautiful allotment site, a minority, perhaps even just one person spoils it by dumping rubbish – please don't. Take it to the tip or if you don't have transport, ask someone to do it for you.

**WINTER**

December 2015

Dear Allotment Holder,

Thank you again to everyone who has managed to place a small sign showing your plot number somewhere prominently on your plot/s; and to those who have not done so yet, please would you arrange this now as soon as possible.

It really does help in so many ways to have all plots numbered up visibly.

The mains water supply to the tanks has been turned off for the winter, and the 3 internal gates have been locked, to avoid damage to the grass pathways.

At last the drainage improvements to the central pathway between the two car parks have been completed. This should make a tremendous difference, and avoid having to access to plots through puddles in future.

It is hoped that a large composting bin, in 3 compartments, for communal use will be constructed shortly on one of the empty plots on the right, beyond the second car park. This should assist everyone to keep their plots clear and clean, and provide a valuable source of rotted down compost in due course.

Whilst on the topic of tidiness, it is apparent that on some plots there is quite an accumulation of unwanted materials, which really should be removed; such items as, large stores of wood, plastic, wire meshing, unwanted frames etc. etc. Would everyone please endeavour to remove these down to the household waste collection site, and help us to maintain tidy allotments. If any assistance is needed in this respect, please let me know, and I'm sure that some help could be arranged. There are several plots which contain young trees which have self-seeded and are wild, and will eventually grow far too large for the site.

If you would all please take a thorough look around your plots, even right along the boundary fences (internal and external), and remove any saplings such as Ash, Damson, Hazel etc. which have not been cultivated, completely before the spring. If you have planted any of these varieties, then please be aware that they must be controlled to grow no higher than 9 feet tall (3 metres maximum); as per the terms of your Agreement, and not interfere with neighbouring plots.

If moles are still a problem on your plot, there are a couple of mole traps which can be loaned out to you if you wish; just contact the office and enquire.

WEEDS – again this year there have been several plots where tall weeds have been allowed to grow, and the winds have blown their seeds around the whole site. This is particularly a nuisance to neighbouring plots, and not very socially responsible. Please do make sure that you cut down offending weeds before they go to seed next year.

There may be the opportunity via a local tree worker to have deliveries of wood chippings from time to time to the site. The advice is that these chippings should not be added growing areas for at least a month, to allow the tannin to be first be released; but it is OK to use immediately on pathways.

It is noted that several areas of plot fencing/gates are damaged/loose/bent. Would ploholders please attend to these issues over the winter months, and carry out any essential repairs. Again, if any assistance is needed, please contact the Town Council. May I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and New Year.

**Two things at the moment are a cause for concern, and they require the co-operation of all ploholders.**

All allotment holders are asked to be vigilant, and to take note of anyone seen to be failing to pick up after their dog. The incident should be reported with names to the Deputy Town clerk or to a member of the committee. Appropriate action will be taken.

And finally, a footnote to say how disappointed we all are that Geoff Brooks, an exemplary gardener, is leaving the allotments. His plot has been both productively and immaculately kept for all the time he has been a tenant.
