

Minutes	Minutes were circulated and read. Matters arising: to be covered in the agenda.
Membership	Bank account stands at £1462.26 with an unpresented cheque for £7.50 still to

Treasurer's	Membership stands at only 20. Hilary outlined the benefits of LAA membership

Waiting List	The waiting list is back up to 23. One plot holder wishes to downsize so a half
	plot may become available soon. One of those on the waiting list has taken
	advantage of the offer of a mini bed until such time as she gets to the top of the
	waiting list for a larger plot. Her work was admired.
Site inspection	This is carried out monthly by Stuart and at least one of the LAA officers. Two
	letters have been issued regarding non-cultivation of plots and some have been
	added to the watch list. Good work by new plot holders was noted and
	commended.
Jobs needing	Stuart has approached a groundworks company to investigate the severe
to be done on	waterlogging on one of the plots. The works will involve an extensive trench
the site	which will also render the two adjacent plots unavailable for rent until the
	investigation is complete.
	Stuart has also ordered more topsoil for some of the mini beds. Stuart is also
	intending to look for quotes for refurbishment of the water tanks, some of
	which have sunk and become tilted and leaky. This puts the price of the
	metered water up unnecessarily and could in the future impinge on plot rents if
	not attended to.
	The tree bog roof still needs attention as one of the roof planks has slipped out
	of place.  The gate by the far end of the site should be moved to by the wildlife area so
	,
	that people do not drive on ground which becomes very wet during the winter.  The Harris fencing by the wildlife area will also be removed.

Progress on Bat boxes	Heather has taken her own bat box to Eaton Barn for their volunteers to use as a template.  Each box should be secure i.e., constructed so that the bats are not handled in any way and needs to be made of untreated wood, which may take longer for Eaton Barn to source as they only use recycled timber. Heather has asked for 6 at a cost of £15 each, total cost £90. The Council might pay for these. It is hoped that the boxes might be ready to be placed on the site in the Spring.
Harvest Supper	The venue is booked annually by the town council and all plot holders and partners are warmly invited to attend on Friday, October 6 <sup>th</sup> at 7.00 pm in the Forbury. This year odd numbered plots are asked to bring desserts and even numbered plots are asked to bring savoury dishes.  This year there will be awards which will be presented by Lesley and David Pritchard who judged the awards and who also assessed the allotments for "It's our Neighbourhood" in Bloom. Prize winners will be notified individually and we hope they will all attend.
Autumn Plant Fair	This is organised by Leominster in Bloom and will take place in Corn Square on 23 <sup>rd</sup> September. Unfortunately, it looks unlikely that we will be able to have a stall because of problems obtaining public liability insurance.
